### Historical Documentation utilized in the ORA program

The United States Congress directed the Commission on Wartime Relocation and Internment of Civilians (CWRIC) to conducted extensive research using government documents held by the National Archives and Records Administration, the Immigration and Naturalization Service, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and the collection on Japanese American evacuation and resettlement at the Bancroft Library of the University of California at Berkeley. It also commissioned a study of the economic impact of the exclusion and internment of Japanese American citizens and permanent resident aliens.

The Office of Redress Administration (ORA) utilized the same historical documentation studied by the CWRIC to identify and locate affected individuals. Initial congressional data indicated that 120,000 people were evacuated, relocated, or interned and actuarial studies presumed that only 60,000 people were living at the enactment of the Civil Liberties Act of 1988. However, it was clear to ORA as early as August 1989 that the number of potentially eligible individuals would exceed the 60,000 figure.

#### **Summary of Cases Processed**

During ORA's operation, although 82,220 payments of \$20,000 payments were made, a total of 85,685 cases were processed. In 3,531 cases of deceased eligible individuals with statutory heirs, the cases were processed in multiple parts, depending on the number of heirs.

Cases processed but not completed: 0.6% of the total potentially eligible 923 individuals are in this category which includes cases such as those who withdrew without completing the process; initially contacted ORA but could not be located later; and those on whom ORA was awaiting documentation at the end of the Redress Program.

Japanese Latin Americans who were found ineligible under the CLA, and JLA's who applied during the Supplemental Funding period, were offered \$5000 under the Mochizuki settlement. 145 received payment of \$20,000 under the CLA; 1 received partial payment before funds were exhausted.

The categories of eligibility were established from the historical records and set forth in the Civil Liberties Act of 1988 and its governing regulations.

# Cases Processed under Summer 1999 Supplemental Funding

February 5, 1999, marked the official closing of ORA. However, there were still a number of cases that had been received prior to the program's sunset and required processing. The summary of these cases is listed below:

<sup>\*</sup> The total class number was revised a few years ago from 730 to 713 as a result of the 17 claimants who "opted out" of the settlement. Also, 145 JLA cases were paid from funding under the Civil Liberties Act of 1988 but are included here to show the entire class. 645 received \$5000; 152 received \$20,000.
