## FOUR ELDERLY IN HAWAII RECEIVE REDRESS CHECKS

HONOLULU, Hawaii (AP).— Four elderly Japanese Americans who were interned during World War II received an apology from the federal government Monday.

During a ceremony at the state Capitol, the four also received

checks for \$20,000.

They were the first Hawaii residents to receive reparations payments. About 274 other elderly Hawaii residents who were interned are scheduled to receive reparations checks during the first few days of the redress payment program.

By the end of the year, 25,000 of the 65,000 former internees eligible for reparations will receive payments and apologies, according to There are between 2,000 and 3,000 former internees in Hawaii, all of whom will be paid within three years, Bratt said.

Monday's ceremony was the last in a series held in various mainland cities over the past five days, start-

ing Oct. 9 in Washington.

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
